

Florida Citrus Production Expected to Increase

Continued increased production of Florida oranges and grapefruit is in prospect as trees already planted become more productive.

Of the orange trees, 7,975,496 were classified as early and midseason varieties, and 6,396,319 as late varieties.

Of the early varieties 27%, and of the late varieties 34%, were four to ten years old.

Of the 5,747,132 grapefruit trees counted, 5,198,872 were four years old or more.
